

## Quiz

### Purpose

Activating all students in a small forum in talking professionally with each other across the board. The students formulate questions themselves, and thus everyone gets a feeling of contributing to a common discussion of a topic.

### Description

- All students write one question on a small piece of paper. The question must be of an academic nature and can, for example, be for a specific text or a topic that you are working with.
- The students are then distributed on the floor. They find a classmate, and take turns asking each other their questions. The questions should only be asked when everyone has a partner. If there is an uneven number of students, a group of three is made.
- Once both students have answered each other's questions, they swap questions and find a new person to ask. They will now ask the question they have just answered to the next one they meet.
- The activity may continue as long time as you have. The intention is not for everyone to talk to everyone, but everyone should talk to someone. As soon as you are done, you raise your hand so others can see that you are ready to "quiz".

### Practical

- Time consumption: 15-20 minutes. The duration can vary depending on how many different questions the students go through.
- Requirements: There must be space in the room to move around.
- Preparation: Use small pieces of paper or post-its to write questions on.

### Tip!

The activity will, for example, be relevant when completing a topic or theme. At this point, the students have gained a lot of knowledge within the theme, and the exercise can help to refresh and talk about this knowledge.
